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the motifs of island and shipwreck have been present in literature and the arts from ancient times whether they occur as plot elements as part of literary or film imagery as symbols in paintings as leitmotifs in songs or as concepts in philosophical theories both have always been a source of fascination to authors artists and

scholars in shipwreck and island motifs in literature and the arts
brigitte le juez and olga springer have gathered essays that
explore shipwreck and island figures in texts as historically
culturally and artistically diverse as walter scott's the lord of
the isles cristina fernández cubas the lighthouse reality tv series
treasure island pop songs of the bbc radio programme desert island
discs or the otolith group's essay film hydra decapita

australia is the planet's sole island continent this book argues
that the uniqueness of this geography has shaped australian history
and culture including its literature further it shows how the
fluctuating definition of the island continent throws new light on
the relationship between islands and continents in the mapping of
modernity the book links the historical and geographical conditions
of islands with their potent role in the imaginaries of european
colonisation it prises apart the tangled web of geography fantasy
desire and writing that has framed the western understanding of
islands both their real and material conditions and their symbolic
power from antiquity into globalised modernity the book also traces
how this spatial imaginary has shaped the modern man who is
imagined as being the island's mirror the inter relationship of the
island fantasy colonial expansion and the literary construction of
place and history created a new man the dislocated and alienated
subject of post colonial modernity this book looks at the
contradictory images of islands from the allure of the desert
island as a paradise where the world can be made anew to their
roles as prisons as these ideas are made concrete at moments of
british colonialism it also considers alternatives to viewing
islands as objects of possession in the archipelagic visions of
island theorists and writers it compares the european
understandings of the first and last of the new worlds the
caribbean archipelago and the australian island continent to
calibrate the different ways these disparate geographies unified and
fractured the concept of the planetary globe in particular it
examines the role of the island in this process specifically its
capacity to figure a graspable globe in the mind the book draws on
the colonial archive and ranges across australian literature from
the first novel written and published in australia by a convict on
the island of tasmania to both the ancient dreaming and the
burgeoning literature of aboriginal and torres strait islanders in
the twenty first century it discusses australian literature in an
international context drawing on the long traditions of literary
islands across a range of cultures the book's approach is

theoretical and engages with contemporary philosophy which uses the island and the archipelago as a key metaphor it is also historicist and includes considerable original historical research

romantic writers often asserted their individuality but this assertion tended to take the form of positioning themselves in relation to other authors and literary texts thus they implicitly acknowledged the rich network of broadly understood poetic dialogue as an important and potent source for their own creativity when in 1816 John Keats wrote *Great Spirits Now on Earth are Sojourning* he celebrated the originality of his contemporaries and the historical significance of his times pointing to deep interest in the hum of mighty works in all the fields of human activity to which the nations ought to listen Keats's sonnet suggests not only stimulating exchanges between poets artists and social thinkers in the same language but also the idea of transnational appreciation and dialogue the volume takes up this idea and explores the dialogues of romantic authors within the wide scope of European and American cultures essays by scholars from Germany Britain Bulgaria Poland Canada and the United States of America examine romantic writers responses to their contemporaries explore their dialogues with the culture of the past and their interactions across the arts and sciences they also scrutinize the romantics far reaching influence on later writers and artists and thus extend the network of artistic exchange to modern times the volume offers a rich tapestry of interconnections that span across time and space interlace languages and cultures and link romantic writers and artists with their predecessors and successors across Europe and America the essays in the collection invite the reader to join ongoing dialogues between writers and their audiences of the past and present

a dreamer petitions his king for a boat and gets more than he bargained for in it his richly enigmatic short story by the Nobel prize winning author Kirke La Seigne a man went to knock at the king's door and said give me a boat the king's house had many other doors but this was the door for petitions but the king spent all his time sitting at the door for favors favors being offered to the king you understand whenever he heard someone knocking at the door for petitions he would pretend not to hear so begins this beautifully illustrated and deceptively simple fable why the petitioner required a boat where he was bound for and who volunteered to crew for him the reader will soon discover in a departure from his

linguistically dense and sprawling historical novels jose saramago presents a philosophic love story worthy of swift or voltaire

from classics like king kong to beloved b movies like the beast from 20 000 fathoms to blockbusters like jurassic park it s easy to see that filmmakers and audiences alike love to see dinosaurs on the screen this comprehensive filmography arranged alphabetically by title contains entries that include basic facts year of release country of origin studio and running time followed by a concise plot summary the author s critical commentary information on the production and the people behind it and secrets of the often ingenious special effects three useful appendices feature films with minor dinosaur content planned but unfinished dinosaur movies and the quasi dinosaurs of toho studios to be included a movie must depict one or more representations of a prehistoric reptile inaccurate portrayals are included as long as the intent is to represent a real or fictional dinosaur not eligible are films featuring prehistoric mammals prehistoric humans or humanoids and beasts of mythology unless of course the movie also has a dinosaur

ecologies of affect offers a synthetic introduction to the felt dynamics of cities and the character of places the contributors capture the significance of affects including desire nostalgia memory and hope in forming the identity and tone of places the critical intervention this collection of essays makes is an active consistent engagement with the virtualities that produce and refract our idealized attachments to place contributors show how place images and attempts to build communities are rather than

abstractions fundamentally tied to and revolve around such intangibles we understand nostalgia desire and hope as virtual that is even though they are not material they are nevertheless real and must be accounted for in this book the authors take up affect emotion and emplacement and consider them in relation to one another and how they work to produce and are produced by certain temporal and spatial dimensions the aim of the book is to inspire readers to consider space and place beyond their material properties and attend to the imaginary places and ideals that underpin and produce material places and social spaces this collection will be useful to practitioners and students seeking to understand the power of affect and the importance of virtualities within contemporary societies where intangible goods have taken on an increasing value

a book is only one text but it is many books it is a different book for each of its readers my anna karenina is not your anna karenina your a house for mr biswas is not the one on my shelf when we think of a favourite book we recall not only the shape of the story the characters who touched our hearts the rhythm and texture of the sentences we recall our own circumstances when we read it where we bought it and for how much what kind of joy or solace it provided how scenes from the story began to intermingle with scenes from our life how it roused us to anger or indignation or allowed us to make our peace with some great private discord this is the second life of the book its life in our life in his early twenties the novelist chandras choudhury found himself in the position of most young people who want to write impractical hard up ill at ease in the world like most people who love to read his most radiant hours were inside the pages of a book seeking to combine his love of writing with his love of reading he became an adept of a trade that is mainly transacted lying down that is he became a book reviewer pleasure independence aesthetic rapture even a modest livelihood all these were the rewards of being a worker bee of literature ingesting the output of the publishers of the world in great quantities and trying to explain in the pages of newspapers and magazines exactly what makes a book leave a mark on the soul even as choudhury s own novels began to be published he continued to write about other writers books his contemporaries at home and abroad the great indian writers of the past the relationship of the reading life in particular the novel to selfhood and democracy all the ways in which literature sings the truths of the human heart my country is literature brings together the best of his literary

criticism a long train of perceptive essays on writers as diverse as vs naipaul and orhan pamuk gandhi and nehru bibhutibhushan bandyopadhyay and jhumpa lahiri the book also contains an introductory essay describing choudhury s book saturated years as a young writer in mumbai the joys and sorrows and stratagems of the book reviewer s trade and the ways in which literature is made as much by readers as by writers delightfully punctuated with 15 portraits of writers by the artist golak khandual my country is literature is essential reading for everyone who believes that books are the most beautiful things in life

in korea s 5 000 year history admiral yi sun sin is considered one of the most respected figures and his legendary warship the turtle ship is recognized as a symbol of korea s shipbuilding technology and military innovation this book revisits admiral yi s achievements and the legacy of the turtle ship which led to the defeat of approximately 700 japanese vessels and secured victory in the 16th century war with japan admiral yi was able to achieve victory in every battle by developing and operating the turtle ship an armored vessel with cannons capable of firing in all directions from the bow stern and both sides allowing his forces to fire safely from within admiral yi and the turtle ship were first introduced to the western world about 100 years ago during the japanese colonial period and figures such as british naval historian admiral g a ballard and wwi hero b l montgomery helped bring some recognition to his legacy however due to a lack of in depth publications or historical resources available in english speaking countries the full historical significance of yi and the turtle ship has not been widely understood internationally the author s dedication and research background this book is the result of over a decade of research by dr ko kwang soob a retired navy captain who graduated from the korean naval academy and served as a professor at the naval academy naval college and various marine related universities drawing on admiral yi s war diary his official battle reports to the king and the records of the annals of the joseon dynasty this book provides readers with an in depth understanding of admiral yi and the turtle ship in particular the book includes recent scientifically backed research findings and newly uncovered insights revealed over the past 50 years by dr ko

and other korean scholars structure and content of the book the book is organized into seven chapters chapter 1 covers the background of the imjin war admiral yi sun sin s life and the unique armament and tactics of the turtle ship chapter 2 details the major battles that admiral yi participated in including the battle of hansen where he achieved victory using the crane wing formation in this chapter battle situations are depicted on google maps based on historical sources helping readers easily understand the joint tactics of the turtle ship and panokseon chapter 3 explores admiral yi s leadership and foresight as he led his forces through outbreaks of disease and famine preparing for future battles chapter 4 explains the collapse of the korean navy under admiral won gyun s command and admiral yi s eventual reinstatement including recent research findings that correct historical misunderstandings chapter 5 recounts the miraculous battle of myeongryang where yi defeated over 130 japanese vessels with only 13 ships as well as the rebuilding of the korean navy chapter 6 focuses on the korea china allied operations yi s collaboration with chinese admiral chen lin and admiral yi s final moments in the battle of noryang summarizing yi s strategies and tactics in comparison with modern military guidelines chapter 7 reflects on admiral yi s legacy both as a military leader and as a public servant dedicated to his family and country through this book the author brings admiral yi sun sin s legacy to readers worldwide celebrating his courage innovation and integrity while offering profound insights into korean history culture and military strategy

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
